The majority of the trackwork is done and what is left, along with the needs of the electrical systems and scenery/structure work can all be done in smaller work periods, leaving the layout fairly accessible for running and operations. Let's have some fun but don't forget there is still work to be done. Get involved and ask "how can I help out?" every chance you get.

The Narrow Gauge layout will be seeing some serious action this year regarding change. At the annual Narrow Gauge Planning Meeting held on January 14, the members decided that it was time to convert the layout over to DCC. With advances in the narrow gauge modeling market, as well as DCC technology in general, there was no reason to limit themselves any longer to analog power control. From now until the April Open House, they will be developing their "battle plan" with intentions of beginning the conversion shortly thereafter.

There will be opportunities to learn more about DCC, how to convert Shinohara switches to be DCC friendly as well as to learn how to hand lay track when some areas of the layout receive alterations. If you are interested in lending a hand see Dave Good, the NG Supervisor, for guidance.

## **PROTOTYPICAL OPERATIONS ON THE SIERRA CENTRAL**

As we enter our sixth year of prototypical operations on the HO standard gauge layout, it's quite appropriate to take a look back to see where we've been and then a look forward to see where we're headed. Early in 2007, construction of the layout had progressed to the point where the idea of having proto ops became a real possibility. Our current "Proto Ops Sessions" on the Sierra Central Railroad has evolved since our first session on December 8, 2007. This first session, however, came about after several meetings, conversations and planning.

#### Looking Back

Although many of the names have changed on the Sierra Central, back in 2007, the mainline was complete along with the yards at Keddie and Desert-Oakland. Half of 12<sup>th</sup> Street yard was built with the second half underway. With Oakland Pier, West Oakland, Oroville and Sacramento in place, doing operations was not an "if" but a "when."

Our earliest conversations on operations centered on what we wanted the sessions to provide and the best way to get this accomplished. Consensus was reached on the following goals and objects:

- 1. The operating system ought to be easy to learn and teach.
- 2. The sessions should involve as many members as possible.
- 3. It must be flexible to accommodate the skills and numbers of operators, the available equipment, and the progressing construction of the layout.
- 4. It should emphasize freight forwarding but allow for passenger service.

The organization of the sessions fell into two camps: cardbased and computer-based. The card-based system was seen as more forgiving and flexible as well as being easier to implement. The computer-based system while having many desirable features was rejected as being too labor intensive to maintain considering the dynamic nature of a club layout. Card systems, like those used on a few local layouts and described in the model railroad press were less tedious and more self-correcting than the computer systems.

The color coded, card-based system used on the Sierra Central is essentially the same as we used in 2007 but has seen several revisions. This system uses car cards with color coded four position waybills to control freight car movement. Blue train cards are used to inform crews of train actions and movements. All train movements outside of the yards are coordinated through the Trainmaster and Dispatcher.

Several revisions have been made including shifting away from timetable based schedules toward running all freight trains as extras. We have implemented green locomotive cards to inform engineers of the DCC commands for the individual units. Yard cards and staging cards help organize the yards.

#### **Looking Forward**


Prototypical Operations has become a popular and regular activity of the Sacramento Model Railroad Historical Society. We were able to share this activity with nearly 40 guests during the NMRA 2011X National Convention when hosted "Proto Ops sessions on both of the Society's layouts. The feedback was overwhelmingly positive even though there were some complaints about July's heat. Going ahead in 2012, we have sessions planned for the first and third Friday nights of every month from 8pm to 10pm with set-up from 7-8pm. These nights were selected as they would not interfere with scheduled meetings of the membership or board of directors. With just two sessions per month, there are nights for clinics, theme events, and plenty of opportunities for free-running.

In the short term, we hope to enlarge our freight fleet by about 100 cars. This could be done by adding to the SMRHS owned "Core" fleet. Preferably, members will "lease" suitable cars to our operations efforts. The immediate need is for freight cars but passenger equipment would greatly enhance our operations. We also expect to enlarge our crews and develop operator skills with training and clinics.

In the long term, one might expect better fast time clocks, deeper card boxes in the yards, and several more passenger trains to run. The yard activities could be enhanced by adding more yard industries such as locomotive servicing to be switched. This could include adding a "hostler" to maintain, service, and supply road power to the yard classification crews. For the road crews, there is a real possibility of adding "chance" cards to simulate hot boxes, weather conditions, out-of-service track, etc. We are exploring options for rotating equipment on and off of the layout through the interchanges or other methods.

All in all, Prototypical Operations on the Sierra Central RR is solid and is heading for a bright future. Proto Ops is very popular with some of the members and interest is growing.
